DESIGN FOR A TOY BANK.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 13,314, dated September 26, 1882.

Application filed July 28, 1882. Term of patent 7 years.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, CHARLES M. HENN, a citizen of the United States, residing at Chicago, county of Cook, and State of Illinois, have invented and produced a new and original Design for Toy Banks, of which the following is a specification, reference being had to the accompanying photograph, as shown at Figure 1, which is a perspective representation of my new design for toy banks.

Heretofore toy banks have been designed to represent bank-buildings, safes, towers, castles, and forts, and on some of these an eagle has been perched, and on some a watch-dog has been represented as guarding the treasure.

The distinguishing feature of my design is a bank made to represent a rock with an eagle perched thereon, and in front of the bank is a representation of a shield, and by the side of the bank is the representation of the statue of a person with one arm bearing on the shield.

A represents the bank in the form of a rock resting on the earth.

B represents the eagle perched on the bank.

C represents the statue of a man standing by the side of the rock.

D represents a shield in front of the rock, and below the shield, and on the rock beneath the shield, are the words and letters "J. A. Garfield." These words, however, may be wholly omitted and other words or letters indicating the name of the bank may be substituted therefor without changing the material features of the design.

The design is made to represent solidity, the national emblem, protection, and a noble type of manhood.

I claim—

The design for a toy bank herein described and shown, consisting of the bank A, made to represent a rock, the eagle B, perched thereon, the shield D, represented at the end of the bank, and the representation of the statue of a man at the side of the bank.
